# **Returning to Holy Week:**

After a pandemic pause, we are happy to be bringing back some of our Holy Week traditions!

## Watch Night, April 6, 9:00p

What is Watch Night? In keeping with Jesus' request that his disciples watch and pray with him in the Garden, we keep watch by gathering in the sanctuary at the top of each hour for Bible reading and meditative songs. Then, one designated person remains in the sanctuary for the remainder of the hour for private prayer. The other attendees fill the time with activities such as preparing for Easter breakfast, tending the fire pit, playing games, enjoying conversation, and engaging in faith reflection.

## Children's Good Friday Service, April 7, 10:00a

This service is designed for preschool and elementary-aged students. The Holy Week story is told in a child-friendly way. We meet in the sanctuary for story, song, and prayer, followed by an activity in Fellowship Hall.

## **Holy Week at Good Shepherd**

#### **April 2, Palm Sunday**

8:30a: This service is a quiet telling of the walk of Jesus towards Jerusalem. Along the journey, we hear of the danger that awaits in that center of power. Palm parade is included in the service.



10:30a: This service tells the same story found in Scripture of Jesus walking toward danger, rather than fleeing. We add more drama and special music. The final palm parade includes liturgical dance.

### **April 6, Maundy Thursday**

7:30p: Maundy Thursday reminds us of the command to love one another. This message is told in four movements that begin at the door with an optional footwashing. This service features readings, activity and music, the Lord's Supper, and ends with a dramatic stripping of the altar.

9:00p: Watch Night will begin after worship. The night is grounded in an hourly reading of scripture in the darkened sanctuary as we "keep watch and pray." Throughout the night, participants engage in activities or sit outside by a fire pit, while one person remains in the sanctuary each hour. Sign up to attend.

#### April 7, Good Friday

10:00a: Children's Good Friday Service that features activities and an ageappropriate telling of the Holy Week story. Recommended for Preschool through Elementary students.

12:00-7:30p: Sanctuary remains open for private prayer and reflection.

7:30p: A Tenebrae service of Word and music that ends in somber darkness.

## April 9, Easter Sunday

8:30a: Simplified but inspiring Easter service with Holy Communion.

10:30a: Get your Easter Bonnets! This celebratory worship service is filled with Alleluias and music, and features a festival choir and trumpet.

Other Easter Activities:

8:30-10:30a: Easter Breakfast served; free will offering collected.

9:45a: Children break open the Lenten Pinata.

10:00a: Easter Egg Hunt on the front lawn.

The Good Friday worship experience will include candlelight and the extinguishing of this light as a symbol of

Christ's death. To reflect the diversity of God's creation, including the diverse history, experience, and stories of our community, you are invited to contribute a candle from your home to the Good Friday candle display. Consider



loaning a candle that has special meaning or a candle that is unique that you would like others to see.

Candles can be brought to the church facility and placed on the steps leading to the balcony. Before doing so, please put a piece of masking tape with your name on the bottom of your candle. Please drop off your candle on or before Palm Sunday (April 2). Our worship team will relocate candles from the balcony steps to areas of Good Friday meditation, light them, and extinguish them during the Good Friday evening service. The candles will be returned to the steps for you to retrieve on and after Easter Sunday (April 9).

Starting at noon on Good Friday (April 7), the sanctuary will be open and available for private reflection, prayer, and meditation. The sanctuary will remain open until evening worship beginning at 7:30p.

Help us fill our barn pinata with your coins, bills, and checks!



# **Updates from Healing Our Earth/ Sustainability Committee:**

#### Quarter One

- Solar panels approved by vote at special congregation meeting. A contract has been signed with Ailey Solar. Installation should begin within the next two to four months, dependent upon weather and coordination with ComEd.
- One Earth Film Festival watch party hosted at Good Shepherd on March 7. At least 80 people attended in-person, and people were connected with other attendees and hosts via live stream. Thirteen vendors and community groups also participated in the Green Home Vendor Fair prior to the viewing party. Thanks to Michelle Sukup Jackson and her team for making this event happen.

#### Quarter Two

- Planning for a rainbow flowerbed in the corner bed.
   Applied for West Cook Wild Ones Gardening for
   Nature Grant to offset costs.
- Looking forward to further development of our Bee Lawn on south side of building. Why a Bee Lawn?
  - ♦ Reduces the need for mowing and watering
  - ♦ Colorful, low-growing, flowering plants provide additional pollen and nectar for bees.
  - Year 2 after planting is when we can expect to see non-grass/sedge species.
  - Contains fine fescue, Dutch white clover, self heal, and creeping thyme
- Signage will be added to our plant beds, etc to help people know what is in our lawns and flowerbeds.
   This helps to promote understanding of things like bee lawns and native plants.

The work in our garden has been recognized! The Garden Club of Oak Park and River Forest has selected the Good Shepherd garden as the community garden that will be on display during the 2023 Garden Walk in June! #### Did you know that Styrofoam can be recycled?

The One Dart Container Corp does Styrofoam recycling. Their facility is located on 76th Street in Chicago. The drop-off dumpster is on the north side of 76th Street just east of Kostner Ave. Look for the sign and big metal cage. Drop-off is available 24/7 rain or shine.

They accept polystyrene foam (Styrofoam) in any form except for packing peanuts. Coolers, cups, foam packing blocks, egg cartons, clean plates, and to-go containers are welcome.

Polystyrene foam can be recycled into some surprising things like picture frames, baseboards, and crown moldings.

# **PASTOR'S PAGE**

If the 40 days of Lent

were a time for quiet

introspection, the 50 days

from Easter to Pentecost

are a time to release the

noticing God in the little

delight experienced in

things all around us.

Lent – It's almost over.

Lent – It's just beginning.

In its earliest days, the time before Easter was primarily a time for fasting, though the length of time shifted by region. Earliest fasts were a short one or two days, lengthening to six days to three weeks by the midthird century. There was nothing different about these fasts from those taken at other times, though some church leaders preferred to use them for

instruction to catechumenates who were baptized on Easter. After the Council of Nicaea in 325, the Lenten fast was set at 40 days.

As we enter April, our 40 days of Lent are coming to a close. Holy Week with all of its drama is about to unfold; the culmination is a joyous Easter celebration the likes of which we haven't seen in a few years. This year we are blessed to return to an Easter Egg Hunt with a

gaggle of children gathered clutching their baskets. Youth will be serving a hot breakfast with egg casseroles, fruit, and plenty of hot coffee. The choir will be singing in full voice without masks muffling their melodies. The end of Lent, Alleluia!

Yet, Lent is just the beginning too.

The word "Lent" comes from the Middle English word lente, meaning "springtime," which is itself descended from the Old English lencten. We've had a mild winter; hyacinths are already emerging from their dark sleep in the earth that was cold and hard for so long. Spring is found in the love songs of birds that are finding their mates and making their nests. We smell spring in the wonderful loamy aroma of a verdant earth after the rains that quench the thirst of awakening blades of grass.

Much like the role that winter plays in preparing for the exuberance of spring, so too the Lenten season is not just about penitence and introspection for its own sake. Rather, Lenten quietness is the preparation for the body's and soul's awakening to new possibilities. Having taken stock of our finitude on Ash Wednesday, as well as our attitude during the other 39 days, we are ready to experience a resurrection of sorts in our lives. The stone is rolled away not just from Christ's tomb, but our entombed joy of communion with the Divine.

If the 40 days of Lent were a time Pastor Kathy Nolte for quiet introspection, the 50 days from Easter to

Pentecost are a time to release the delight experienced in noticing God in the little things all around us.

You are invited to take part in a short daily devotion that is meant to spark joy. It is called, "Fifty Days of Spiritual Practice." Many days these take a few minutes. For instance, the Wednesday after Easter you are instructed to make funny faces in the mirror for 2 minutes and see if joy is welling up in

your heart. There is a week of noticing colors, a different one each day, culminating in a prayer for the rainbow. You'll be asked to notice the moon or stars at night before bed or birds flying in the day. The "Fifty Days of Spiritual Practice" comes to us from Traci Smith who creates Treasure Box Tuesday for youth and family ministry. Most prompts are relatable to children without any adaptations. "Fifty Days of Spiritual Practice," will be available in the church throughout Holy Week, as well as on the weekly Enews sent via mailchimp.

## Community

So you've joined Good Shepherd - or you've been a member for a few years or like some of us, a lot of years! It's a wonderful community of believers but how does one go from just worshiping to really feeling like they belong? How does one become an involved member?
