Holy Week at Good Shepherd

March 24, Palm Sunday, 8:30 and 10:30a

As Holy Week begins, we hear the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem through the perspective of Peter. The crowd's singing of Hosanna is subversive, coura-



geous, and contagious. Their praise shows the ripple effect of public displays of faith. Do we feel the dissonance of Jesus, who hears the cheering Hosannas and knows that his journey leads to the cross?

March 28, Maundy Thursday

6:30p: Agape Meal — Much like Peter and the disciples, we gather in the Fellowship Hall for a service that is both meal and worship combined. This all-generational service has activities for children and adults. Be sure to sign up for this service on our Prayers and More form to indicate your attendance, sign up for a dish to share, and whether you can help set up or clean up.

8:00p: Watch Night — After the meal, we continue to move through Peter's journey of those last days with Jesus. After the Passover meal, Jesus went to pray, asking Peter and the disciples only to "keep watch." Watch Night can be an all night experience or just a few hours. See more details about Watch Night on page 4.

March 29, Good Friday

10:00a: Children's Good Friday Service — This service features activities and an age-appropriate telling of the Holy Week story. Recommended for Preschool through Elementary students.

7:30p: Candles and solemn tones set the mood to hear the last words of Christ before his death on the cross. Good Friday reminds us that the freedom to obey Jesus comes as a gift from God through the cross of Christ. At the cross, our old life of captivity to sin is finished, and our new life of discipleship begins.

March 31, Easter Sunday, 8:30 and 10:30a

Get out your Easter Bonnets! Our Easter services are filled with Alleluias, colorful flowers, and music. 10:30a worship will enjoy a festival choir and brass.

8:30-10:30a: Easter Breakfast served; free will offering collected.

9:45a: Children break open the Lenten Pinata.

10:00a: Easter Egg Hunt on the front lawn.

Holy Week for Families

It's always tricky when Holy Week coincides with Spring Break, but we wanted to let you know about aspects of Holy Week that are perfect for families!

- Palm Sunday—Our Palm Sunday worship service includes speaking parts for the children of the congregation. Music Director Carl Heine will start practicing with the Sunday School classes on March 10.
- Maundy Thursday—Although it begins at 6:30p, the Agape meal is a very family-friendly event that combines worship with a meal. It is full of ritual and meaning. Older kids will want to stay for at least a portion of Watch Night (described in detail on page 4).
- 3. **Good Friday Children's Service**, 10:00a—Specifically designed for Preschool and Elementary aged children, this service features an age-appropriate telling of the Holy Week story with interactive elements.
- 4. Easter—Family opportunities abound on Easter morning! Come for Easter Breakfast and stay for worship! We'll also open our Lent pinata at 9:45a and begin our Easter Egg Hunt on the front lawn at 10:00a! Don't be late ... egg hunts don't last long! ©

African American History and Stories in Oak Park Sunday, March 3, 9:15a

Presenter: Peggy Tuck Sinko, *GS member and* president ex-officio of the Oak Park-River Forest Historical Society

African Americans have been residents of Oak Park since the late 19th century, but their stories are often overlooked. Some still believe that there were no African Americans in the Village before the arrival of the Percy Julian family. Peggy will highlight some of these stories, with an emphasis on the role of religious leaders and institutions, from the formation of the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church by Black residents (1905-1930) to the upheavals of the Civil Rights and Fair Housing movements of the 1960s and 1970s. She is the co-author of *Suburban Promised Land: The Emerging Black Community in Oak Park, 1880-1980* (2009).

American Heart Association Presentation

Too often women take a secondary or supporting role in music. This ignores their important contribution to the field. Celebrating Palm Sunday

Our worship services on March 24 focus on Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, the beginning of Holy Week. At 10:30 this involves the entire congregation - children, adults and choir - in an interactive telling of the story



through the eyes of Peter, Matthew, Jesus, the crowds, the Pharisees, and even the donkey. In Sunday School, the children will rehearse the parts they will say and practice the procession with palms. If you are interested in reading the part of Jesus, Peter, Matthew, the Donkey Owner, a Pharisee (no acting or memorizing is involved), please talk to Carl Heine or write to him at music@goodshepherdlc.org. There will be a rehearsal on Saturday, March 23 at 10:30 am for designated readers.

"Watch Night" Explained

Following the Maundy Thursday Agape meal, we will transition into Watch Night, a simultaneously fun and deeply moving experience built around Jesus' plea to his disciples to stay awake with him in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Starting at 8:00p, we gather in the darkened sanctuary to hear a short portion of the Passion story and sing, "Stay with Me," a Taizé song recounting Jesus' words to watch and pray. Everyone leaves the sanctuary except for one person who signed up to stay awake in the sanctuary and keep watch. While keeping watch, you can meditate, play the piano or other instrument, walk and pray, knit, draw, or do whatever is meditative for you.

Meanwhile, everyone else is in Fellowship Hall or outside around the firepit at the church's front entrance. If you're outside you can roast marshmallows, play Ghost in the Graveyard, or just visit around the fire, often chatting with dogwalkers who are curious about what's going on. If you're inside, you can play games, fill plastic eggs for Sunday's Easter Egg hunt, make bread for Easter communion, do arts and crafts, journal, play the Orff instruments, or other planned or suggested activities.

On the hour, a bell will ring to bring everyone back into the sanctuary to hear the next portion of the Passion story, sing "Stay with Me," and then the next person remains in the sanctuary to keep watch.

You can participate as late as you want — even staying all night until 6a. This vigil is deeply moving and makes Good Friday even more real and Easter more joyful. At the same time, it's a great opportunity to get acquainted with, or build closer relationships with, others keeping watch.

Reflection: Working Shoulder by Shoulder

Daniel Scherer-Emunds served as a Carman International Fellow in Tanzania through Mosaic International from August 2022 to December 2023. His work was with children and young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. He looks back upon his time there.

It was a life-changing experience working *bega kwa bega* (shoulder by shoulder) with the Building a Caring Community (BCC) team in Moshi, Tanzania for the past 16 months. I am so grateful to have been even a small part of their incredible impact and comprehensive supports for 215+ local children and young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families.

It was going to be my first time in East Africa, so before going, I collected as many perspectives about Tanzania as I could from American and Tanzanian friends who had close connections to the land and culture. One question I asked was what were the first three words that came to their minds regarding Tanzania. The responses included hospitality, faith, peaceful, friendly, family, opportunity, overwhelming and low-resource environment.

While the words my friends shared with me ended up ringing true, the first three words that now come to my mind are: Pamoja (Swahili for Togetherness), Aliveness, and Music.

Pamoja (Togetherness)

The communal nature of everyday life and culture in Tanzania is strikingly different than the individualistic mind-



sets that often exist in the US.

There's an everyday Swahili phrase *tuko pamoja*, meaning "we are in this together." It's a comforting expression of solidarity. There's much togetherness in the work of BCC. BCC leaves no child behind regardless of socioeconomic status or disability severity. The tireless and compassionate team give their all to serve as many children as possible and disrupt the vicious cycle of disability and poverty that so many families there experience.

In a society where there is still widespread and isolating misperceptions about disability being a curse from God, a product of witchcraft, or the fault of the mother, BCC's service is transformative and vital. BCC speaks often about building community; it's in the name itself. One aspect of BCC programs includes psychosocial supports for family members of young people with disabilities. Many caregivers told

me how BCC's community has so positively impacted them. As a mother at BCC's Pasua Center shared, "Thanks to BCC for seeing the need of the community and providing a safe environment for our kids and ourselves. We did not have confidence to bring out our children with disabilities. We were thinking we were different from other community members. Now we know other people have others to carry that burden with us. We are thankful to BCC and to God for BCC existing."

ence in Moshi and with BCC. There was never a dull day or dull moment, and my work with BCC was often unpredictable as well. On any given day, I had to be prepared for helping support children in the centers, accompanying outreach workers on home visits, leading trainings for staff and/or caregivers, contributing ideas to BCC's strategic plans for program expansion, writing proposals and policies, reporting grants, capturing photos/videos, doing website/social media work, developing partnerships with other community organizations/schools, supporting international volunteers and visitors, participating in church-affiliated events and activities, helping to respond to emergencies and more.

BCC can be a life-giving and life-saving service for many. One mother from the Longuo neighborhood told me bluntly, "Without BCC, I would be dead and buried. I thought I was the only one who had a child with a disability. I got encouraged through the parent seminars and finding others like me. I was perceiving him as a burden

(continued from page 5) to me, and other people in the community perceived the same. I came to recognize these children are a big blessing to the family."

However, not all families share the same story. There are multiple sides to life, and with the aliveness came some intimate experiences with death. During my 16-month tenure there, the number of funerals I was invited to for loved ones of friends was staggering. In 2023 alone, despite the team's best efforts, BCC mournfully saw four children pass due to various causes, including respiratory failure, hypoglycemia and malnutrition. All these children were living in extreme poverty in rural areas and receiving home services, through which it's a challenge to consistently monitor and follow up on health status. On a home visitation with parents in the Msaranga neighborhood who had just lost their 5-year old child, my BCC co-worker asked me to say a prayer for the family. I'd never been at such a loss for words in my life.

Music

One of my favorite ways to explore and learn about a new place is through music created there. I did my best to dive deep into the worlds of Tanzanian hip-hop, Bongo Flava (Afropop), Zilipendwa (jazz oldies from the days of Tanzanian independence), Amapiano (South African music with wide percussive basslines and synths), Congolese rumba, and more.



Helping to develop a new program partnership with Simbas Footprints—a community center located near many BCC clients—was one of my proudest accomplishments during my time with the BCC. Simbas Footprints aims to unlock youth potential through creative programming and community-driven solutions. They have an outstanding youth music program with a fully-equipped practice room and music studio. Our collaboration resulted in BCC young adults attending their center once a week for music, dance and art classes. It was amazing to see how excited and energized the BCC youth would get when we attended. Our students would eagerly ask me, "When are we going to Simbas again?!" We also worked with Simbas on several community events including World Down Syndrome Day and the BCC Disability Festival. They also invited some BCC youth to join them on a safari to Arusha National Park. The partnership gave BCC youth a pivotal

chance to learn new skills, explore their interests and engage with their communities in new and inclusive ways.

I could go on for an eternity about my impressions of Tanzania and Moshi and BCC. Moshi is a truly special place, and BCC is a truly special organization doing truly special work. My time there carried a complex mix of heartbreak and triumph, and I'm grateful for all of it. I'm thankful for deepened levels of compassion and patience, values of community, feelings of aliveness and inspiration and new music-based explorations and endeavors. I'm thankful for un-learnings of a Western sense of urgency and individualism. I hope I added even a little value to the program, the team's efforts and the lives of the people BCC serves.

As BCC continues to move forward and looks to expand into new districts for programming in 2024, I wish them nothing but success and abundance. I know how committed they are to serving this population, and I've seen how under-served this population is. In the words of Sister Woinde, BCC's occupational therapist and one of the most compassionate people I've ever met, "My dream is that we can bring the program to other areas we have not yet reached. BCC is unique. Nobody is providing the services that we are, and people are in need. I pray every day to God children with disabilities and their families can get the same type of service in their own communities. People are suffering, and they need service. So, if it's possible, I want us to move to other areas and reach children and work with them as early as possible."

Celebrating Dr. Carl Heine's Five Years with Good Shepherd!

In 2018, we not only lost our building through a roof fire, but we also lost our Director of Music, who took a job in Denmark. ELCA Social Statement Input Wanted

How as Lutherans should we understand our relationship to civic life — including government — as individuals and as a church body? After studying the questions for the past three years, a social statement task force has posted a draft social statement on civic life and faith.

Between now and Sept. 30, 2024, you are invited to study and give feedback on the draft by filling out an <u>online</u> <u>survey</u> or attending a hearing in your synod, as available. To access the draft and the survey, and to find information on how to host a hearing in your synod, go to <u>www.elca.org/civicsandfaith</u> or contact the Good Shepherd church office.

After the feedback period has closed, the task force will revise the draft with attention to the public input and submit a proposed version of the social statement to the ELCA Church Council, which will vote on sending it to the ELCA 2025 Churchwide Assembly for consideration. If adopted at the assembly by a two-thirds margin, the social statement will become official social teaching of this church.

will be April 15. Not surprisingly, that news has raised the anxiety of the congregation. Questions about how things will run, what the transition will look like, and how Good Shepherd will find another pastor have all begun.

In the midst of it all, I want you to hang onto this promise: "Everything is going to be alright."

If it has seemed that I am exceptional at leading the congregation, that is only because I am surrounded by exceptional people. First, there is staff. In 2020, I both went on sabbatical for three months and began a part-time position with the Metropolitan Chicago Synod of the ELCA. Staff kept things running smoothly in both cases.

Office Administrator Kimberly Adami-Hasegawa and Deaconess Debbie Speer have primary responsibility in the office making many day-to-day decisions. Kimberly maintains the calendar, coordinates space use, assists our treasurers with accounts payable, creates our worship bulletins and Epistle, and much more. Deaconess Debbie, in addition to running our Christian Education program, designs our newsletter, and has a strong sense of the overall events and ministries of Good Shepherd. At our weekly staff meetings, they keep me up to date on weekly happenings and remind me of what needs my attention. As you move forward without me, know that they have both worked closely with me when making decisions about a new direction or initiative. Both are wise, creative, and attentive to details.

Since 2020, Kerstin Hedlund has served as primary contact for pastoral care and Fred Reklau has provided care for our members who are unable to attend in-person worship. Even when members connect with me over a matter, my task has been to move their pastoral care to Pastor Kerstin. In addition to Deaconess Debbie, Kerstin has also helped with teaching in the confirmation program for several years.

Starting in 2020, there has been a strong Worship Planning Team, consisting of Dr. Carl Heine, Mark Ledogar, Lynn Railsback, Pastor Kerstin, and as of late, David Anderson. These people work with me to plan every worship service on both the micro and macro level. When determining themes for

ties to write whole liturgies and song-filled dramas. On a weekly basis, we verify the specific elements of each worship service: words, music, participants, before anything is entered into the bulletin. In addition, we debrief each worship service that just happened. Your comments about sound, flow, and general experience of worship inform decisions we make going forward.

There are strong, dedicated people serving on the Congregational Council and our ten Committees. This past weekend we joined in a retreat where the leaders formed stronger cross-committee connections. In addition, we mapped out a structure for work going forward that began with the question, "How do you relate to me (Pastor Kathy)?" and "Where does that go?" We identified existing teams and created structure for new teams. I made a commitment to put instructions for things that I know on the leadership Google drive. It might even contain a video on such things as "How to drain the water from the dishwasher," "How to reset the sanctuary lights when they are stuck," and "How to take down the Fellowship Hall walls." We even discussed who would be the point person if there is another emergency where the Village of Oak Park or Housing Forward need to use our space.

I can't say that we will have discussed every possibility for how you will function without me. But I do know this, if I look like a strong, intelligent, gifted pastor it is due to a multitude of people who stand alongside me. I have been blessed to work with the most gifted group of people God has gathered in a congregation. Good Shepherd has accomplished amazing things in the past sixteen years and is known for the way that our faith in Christ is found in our engagement in the world. I know that engagement and accomplishment will continue long after I am gone, because you are the ones who both encouraged me and worked with me all of these years.

So do not worry about what will happen. With God's help and the talent of many people, you will move forward with even greater strength than you see now.
